Autism Federal Election Scorecard

This document is a summary of the major political parties' responses to the Australian Autism Alliance priorities, outlined in its Change 4 Autism 2019 Federal Election Manifesto.

Input for the scorecard has been taken from the responses by the major parties and publically available information. Policies included target disability more broadly, with **autism-specific commitments in bold**.

We have also included some policies that have been announced previously by the government and are not commitments. This has been done on the basis of fairly and accurately reporting the policy positions of the parties, in relation to our priorities, utilising the information provided to us by the parties.

The Alliance will continue to advocate for Australian autistic people and their families after the election on 18 May, to ensure these commitments are delivered by the Commonwealth Government.
